COLLECTIVE AGREEMENT TENKE FUNGURUME MINING

The negotiations between the Company and TFM Union that began last May came to a successful conclusion on August 25, 2011 with the signing of the Revised Collective Agreement at the Base Camp Social Club.
Attending the ceremony was a large delegation from Lubumbashi, Kolwezi and Lubudi.

The Provincial Governor was represented by the Provincial Minister for Health, Labor and Social Welfare.

Also in attendance were the Mayor of Kolwezi, the Administrator of the Territory of

Lubudi, and the Head of Fungurume. Several company officials also attended the event. In his introductory remarks, Mr. Urbain Tshipeng noted that TFM produces vital minerals for the economic development of the country and the whole world. In the DRC, TFM is contributing to the development of the region through its numerous social actions that include building schools, supplying drinking water in rural and urban areas, implementing community health programs, and other actions that benefit the local communities.

In their remarks, Company officials - Claude Polet, Rick Gittleman and Roger Ndala noted that the successful conclusion of this Revised Collective Agreement was the result of joint efforts between the Union and the Company. This new agreement will remain in effect for an indefinite period of time. Both parties welcomed the open dialogue and climate of mutual trust among the various partners, which bodes well for the future of

the Company.
The Minister of Health urged both parties to continue along this path and invited everyone to comply with their obligation to respect each other's rights, as provided for by legal, regulatory and conventional texts.

The event was concluded by the signing of this important document, which, from now on, will govern the operations within TFM.

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From June 7 to June 10, 2011, Tenke Fungurume Mining, in partnership with the NGO Group One, organized a training session for the benefit of local contractors who do or plan to do business with TFM. The training took place at the Community Development Center in Fungurume. Nine contractors received training on capacity building and business management. For four days, the participants learned how to be successful and sustain their small and medium-sized companies. TFM is committed

entrepreneurs who,



through the development of small and medium-sized companies, create jobs and help meet local needs. These local entrepreneurs are the backbone for town development.

The June session focused on four modules:

- Generating and managing icome;
- Understanding techniques for negotiation, supply and demand;
- Running a business in a complex market;
- Effective use of management tools;

The closing session took place on June 10 and included the presentation of certificates to participants.

CAPACITY BUILDING AT MINES OPS

Mr. Patrick Tshibanda, Blasting and Drilling Supervisor, came back from Australia in early

July with a Participation Certificate, from a June 19 to 25 training session on Optimization of Blasting Techniques conducted by Blast Consulting Services, a firm known around the world.

"I have learned a new technique for calculating parameters of drilling and blasting for the purpose of improving the quality of blasting in our mine. From now on, I am able to control vibrations during blasting in order to prevent them (i.e. the vibrations) from damaging the mounds," he commented.

"The technique I learned ensures a good quality of blasting with fewer projections. It also allows good fragmentation of the rock in order to increase efficiency and transport of minerals," explained Tshibanda.

In addition, a Mines OPS team took part in a training session on the New Computerized Dispatching System.

The training session was organized by the Phoenix Freeport-McMoRan Dispatch Bureau but took place at Cerro Verde in Arequipa, Peru, from July 27 to August 12, 2011. Back from this "Train the Trainer" trip, Tshinguz, Sepeti, Mulowenu and Matipa admitted to having improved their skills for a new management of the overall operations at Kwatebala mine.
